

### Dear friends, Sometimes it takes someone from outside of your

world to remind you of something that is beautiful but has become your wallpaper. Last summer I was taking the wedding of a young couple who met at Birmingham University. Friends travelled from far and wide to be with them, and one young lady came over to me before the service started to tell me that she thought St Mary's churchyard was a beautiful place. She said, 'I live in the city and there is nowhere like this near me. Your churchyard tells the story of your village, those who lived here, married here and died here, young and old. It's beautiful.'

I walk through the churchyard several times a week and it's easy for it to become part of the furniture, to think of it as little more than a thoroughfare from the car park to the Church. But it is a history of the village as much as a place of worship and, given its history of being there for more than a thousand years, that place has witnessed extraordinary events - plagues, civil wars, invasions, European wars, World Wars, pandemics and so much more.

> St Mary's is there to serve the village, and each generation has tried to do so to the best of its ability, reshaping the building to meet changing needs.

We're no different as we begin a building project ourselves and you can find out more about this in the included booklet.

The churchyard is a reminder that our time on earth is fleeting and fragile and, in the grand scheme of things, we're really not that significant... our lives are a tiny, tiny dot in the history of the world.

Yet, that's not the whole story, for the Bible teaches that you are created in the image of God and so have purpose. Fallen, imperfect and flawed, yes. But with inherent worth. Christians believe that, however extraordinary it may seem, Jesus of Nazareth was God incarnate, God revealed to humans in the flesh. His teaching shows us how best to live this human life, for he said 'I have come to bring life, and life in all its fullness.' His death by crucifixion somehow paid the price for all the wrong that human beings have done and will do, making forgiveness - that oh so needed gift - possible. And his resurrection from the dead is a deposit that guarantees our resurrection for anyone who believes and trusts in this, and offers the possibility of salvation from God's coming judgement and eternal life.

You can discover a little more about this in the following pages as well as seeing how, in partnership with our friends in East Horsley, Ockham and Ripley, you can journey through Holy Week into Good Friday and the Easter Sunday celebrations. Whether you believe this or think it all nonsense, I want to remind you that your life is no mistake, you are inherently valuable and were made for a purpose. Happy Easter!


# We are here for you...

## **Easter Resurrection**

What gave birth to Christianity? Was it Jesus' teaching? Was it Jesus' healing ministry? Was it the virgin birth?

Interestingly, it was none of these things. Without doubt, Jesus' teaching has been widely accepted as being some of the most profound philosophical teaching in history. Without doubt, Jesus' healing ministry in curing diseases and raising people from death to life is unparalleled. Without doubt, the story of the virgin birth is remarkable. However, none of these things, of themselves, gave birth to Christianity.

What inspired the early Christians to risk everything, including their own lives, was the resurrection. What caused the Christian message to spread from a small group of people in Israel to become the religion of the Roman empire and then shape civilisation was the resurrection.

Why? The biggest enemy confronting our existence is death. Jesus promised to overcome sin and death. Nobody had ever done this before or since. Could Jesus really overcome death? Following his crucifixion at the hands of his executioners, Jesus appeared many times to many people. This was recorded in many manuscripts and these manuscripts were circulated only a few years after Jesus' death. As a result, there is an overwhelming volume of evidence to suggest that the resurrection is one of the best attested facts of the ancient world. If what Jesus said about his death and resurrection was correct then, it follows, everything else he said was also correct. God, the creator of the universe, loves us and wants to have a relationship with us through His Son. But there is even more.

There is a Chinese proverb, 'we live *in interesting times*'. This is not to be regarded as a good thing but as

warming.

What should be our response? A few years ago, there was a slogan for Christian Aid 'we believe in life before death'. This must remain a priority for the church. We must, by all means possible, partner with God in caring for all life forms on this planet and yet we also have to acknowledge that we can't do it all. Like the disciples who, on the night of the first good Friday, grieved the loss of their Messiah, we need the hope of the first Easter day. We need the God of the universe who promises to make all things new. We need the God of the cosmos who holds the planets in his hand. This is the God who can restore everything. Everything. This is the God of the Church vesterday, today, and forever. And the evidence, the visible and tangible proof of this reality was, is and always will be the resurrection.

The same power that brought Jesus back from death to life is the same power that will restore the universe. For all of us, that is the significance of the resurrection.

### CS Lewis on Living in Perilous Times

This morning, with the sun shining on lush grass and dancing daffodils, I find that it's not so difficult to forget some of the rhetoric in the news about the perilous age we are living in.

But there have been many times over the last few months when I have avoided watching the news on TV: the stories tell of such atrocities and suffering and seem to relish highlighting the possibility of worse to come. The conflict between feeling that I should know what is happening in the world while also wanting to block out the news and maintain a personal sense of peace is quite unsettling.


#### While you'll probably be familiar with the Chronicles of Narnia by CS Lewis the famous Christian author, like me, you may be less familiar with his non-fiction essays and Christian apologetics.

I have been fascinated to find a number of recent articles and social media posts about facing dangerous times, referencing an essay written by CS Lewis in 1948 'On Living in an Atomic Age'. They observe how relevant his words are for today, reminding us how to keep concerns and fears for the future of the world in perspective. Here's the much-quoted excerpt:

'In one way we think a great deal too much of the atomic bomb. "How are we to live in an atomic age?" I am tempted to reply: "Why, as you would have lived in the sixteenth century when the plague visited London almost every year, or as you would have lived in a Viking age when raiders from Scandinavia might land and cut your throat any night; or indeed, as you are already living in an age of cancer, an age of syphilis, an age of paralysis, an age of air raids, an age of railway accidents, an age of motor accidents."

In other words, do not let us begin by exaggerating the novelty of our situation. Believe me, dear sir or madam, you and all whom you love were already sentenced to death before the atomic bomb was invented: and quite a high percentage of us were going to die in unpleasant ways. We had, indeed, one very great advantage over our ancestors — anaesthetics; but we have that still. It is perfectly ridiculous to go about whimpering and drawing long faces because the scientists have added one more chance of painful and premature death to a world which already bristled with such chances and in which death itself was not a chance at all, but a certainty.

This is the first point to be made: and the first action to be taken is to pull ourselves together. If we are all going to be destroyed by an atomic bomb, let that bomb when it comes find us doing sensible and human things — praying, working, teaching, reading, listening to music, bathing the children, playing tennis, chatting to our friends over a pint and a game of darts - not huddled together like frightened sheep and thinking about bombs. They may break our bodies (a microbe can do that) but they need not dominate our minds.'



This is just the sort of common-sense approach I need to hear. Giving in to fear doesn't make things better and news of impending doom isn't anything different or new. While 'pull yourself together' probably isn't considered a helpful phrase these days, I find the point about remembering to focus on the ordinary everyday precious things of life to be a useful reminder.

So next time the sun doesn't shine and the world news makes my heart sink, I will endeavour to remember CS Lewis' wise words. His simple outlook reminds me of a poem my Nan loved to quote when facing hard times:

'God has not promised sun without rain, joy without sorrow, peace without pain. But he has promised strength from above, unfailing sympathy, undying love'


